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Barham Golf Trip

Unfortunately the Barham trip has been cancelled until further notice due to lack of sufficient participants.

Bacchus Marsh Golf Club was formed at a meeting in the Mechanics' Institute on 23 April 1907.

The annual subscription was set at five shillings.

So began a long battle for members to establish facilities for local golfers. Until 1972 members struggled at several sites including Racecourse Reserve, which is Crown land. Lack of water in the dry climate, and no land to call their own meant that golf was played on sand scrape greens only during the winter months.

The members' decision to buy their own land in Links Road was momentous. \$40,000 was raised for the purchase of 120 acres of picturesque Lerderderg River front land including vital irrigation rights.

(A small group of members opposed to the move formed a new club and stayed at the Racecourse.)

Led by then club president the late Tom Swan, the small band of enthusiastic members worked at weekends, planting hundreds of trees, helping to build the new course. A sparse landscape was gradually transformed into the 18 hole course of today. Opening day was held on March 24th, 1974, when members and guests joined in the celebrations, 246 players competing in the first event.

The new clubhouse opened in 1975. Residential development soon followed, continuing to expand today. Surprising to present day visitors is the fact that there were only six trees on the whole site at that time



To celebrate the Golf Club's centenary in 2007, a book From Millbank to the Lerdy was launched. The book documents the club's first 100 years including social history of Bacchus Marsh, such as the war years, population, rainfall etc. Photos displayed in the clubhouse and in the book show the development at Links Road since 1973, and the club's first century.

Walkinshaw Sports has donated a prize bag to be awarded to the player with the best net score for each month for next 11 months.



Hannah Green

After turning pro in late 2016, Hannah Green produced an unbelievable rookie season on the Symetra Tour the following year, claiming three wins and immediate promotion to the LPGA Tour for 2018. Green was named the Symetra Tour's Rookie of the Year in 2017 after finishing second on the money list and recording a massive 12 top 10s. She has held down an LPGA Tour card since 2018 and made her US Women's Open debut in June, 2019.

Weeks later, Green produced the performance of a lifetime, becoming the third player to win the KPMG Women's PGA Championship wire-to-wire. The 22-year-old carded a final round 72 at Hazeltine to hold off major winners Ariya Junagarh and Sung Hyun Park on the final day, making a clutch sand save from a greenside bunker on the 72nd hole to seal the win.

Green became Australia's third female major champion and the win was her first on the LPGA Tour. The win lifted Green to a career-high 29th on the world rankings.

Crooks use clever schemes to defraud millions of people every year.

They often combine new technology with old tricks to get people to send money or give out personal information. Here are some practical tips to help you stay a step ahead.


1. **Spot imposters.** Scammers often pretend to be someone you trust, like a government official, a family member, a charity, or a company you do business with. Don't send money or give out personal information in response to an unexpected request — whether it comes as a text, a phone call, or an email.

2. **Do online searches.** Type a company or product name into your favourite search engine with words like "review," "complaint" or "scam." Or search for a phrase that describes your situation, like "IRS call." You can even search for phone numbers to see if other people have reported them as scams.

3. **Don't believe your caller ID.** Technology makes it easy for scammers to fake caller ID information, so the name and number you see aren't always real. If someone calls asking for money or personal information, hang up. If you think the caller might be telling the truth, call back to a number you know is genuine.

4. **Don't pay upfront for a promise.** Someone might ask you to pay in advance for things like debt relief, credit and loan offers, mortgage assistance, or a job. They might even say you've won a prize, but first you have to pay taxes or fees. If you do, they will probably take the money and disappear.

5. **Consider how you pay.** Credit cards have significant fraud protection built in, but some payment methods don't. Wiring money through services like Western Union is risky because it's



nearly impossible to get your money back. That's also true for gift cards (like iTunes or Google Play). Government offices and honest companies won't require you to use these payment methods.

6. **Talk to someone.** Before you give up your money or personal information, talk to someone you trust. Con artists want you to make decisions in a hurry. They might even threaten you. Slow down, check out the story, do an online search, consult an expert — or just tell a friend.

7. **Hang up on robocalls.** If you answer the phone and hear a recorded sales pitch, hang up and report it to the ACCC. These calls are illegal, and often the products are bogus. Don't press 1 to speak to a person or to be taken off the list. That could lead to more calls.

8. **Be sceptical about free trial offers.** Some companies use free trials to sign you up for products and bill you every month until you cancel. Before you agree to a free trial, research the company and read the cancellation policy. And always review your monthly statements for charges you don't recognize.

9. **Don't deposit a cheque and wire money back.** By law, banks must make funds from deposited cheques available within days, but uncovering a fake cheque can take weeks. If a cheque you deposit turns out to be a fake, you're responsible for repaying the bank.

10. **If you spot a scam,** report it to the ACCC – Australian Competition & Consumer Commission. Your reports help the ACCC and other law enforcement investigate scams and bring crooks to justice.
